## Interview with Judy Murray, Irish Beach Water District bookkeeper, former office manager, former Director, etc., etc.

I recently sat down with Judy Murray to learn about her 20+ years with the Irish Beach Water District, serving in various roles or combinations of roles, including Director, Treasurer, and bookkeeper. She also served as an office manager, and as I listened to her story, I couldn't help but feel that if the water district had needed some other business expertise, she would have gladly provided it. When she hesitated to specify a singular top achievement in her 20 years of service to Irish Beach Water District, I sensed that her most satisfying times appeared to be related more to the "who" than the "what."

The people she served with is a virtual Who's Who of Irish Beach Water District history: Frame, Whitaker, Poling, Jassowski, Harley, Heinzer, Ellison, Terry, Acker, Rogers, DeVaul, Cong, Fromwiller, Sackman, Emrick, and Dial. Indeed, as she formulated her answer, she lauded the teams' respect, fellowship, and accomplishments more than any task or project.

Her lengthy list of projects, challenges, and accomplishments made clear she felt directly involved in the teamwork that secured the district's future through her professional skills and flexibility. A somber pride in her sense of ethics shone through.

She beamed as she spoke about her son and daughter, her six grandchildren and her great granddaughter. She mirthfully quipped that "old accountants never die; they just lose their balance." But she has hers yet and is happy to serve.
